From the Pastor

Labor Day Weekend is a reminder of how work has changed over the past decades. Work at one time meant primarily manual labor. My grandfather never knew the modern technology found on almost every dairy farm. For instance, the manure wasn't automatically washed away into a huge underground storage area. My grandmother started the day by starting a fire in the cookstove.

Almost every occupation today has less manual labor and has been replaced by a different type of work that inevitably puts more exertion on the brain and less on the muscles. When the third commandment is explained by Martin Luther in his Large Catechism, he says that we should "abstain from hard work and to rest, so that man and beast might be refreshed and not be exhausted by constant labor." Luther went on to say that for Christians, the commandment warns us that "where the heart stands idle and the Word is not heard, the devil breaks in and does his damage before we realize it." What Luther would suggest to us in our world today is that we are subjected to almost constant emotional stress that our modern technology has caused. While our physical muscles aren't as exhausted, our mental muscles have become increasingly under stress. We need to replace the stress of our everyday existence with the comfort that comes from God's Word.

As we begin our fall schedule, Luther's words in the Large Catechism suggest that we look again at how we use our weekends. Will our children's hearts stand "idle and the Word is not heard?" Will our own hearts receive the holy nourishment of God's Word and Sacrament? Would joining in the adult Bible study help our faith to mature?

Sabbath Day is a time for spiritual refreshment through the hearing of God's Word. His Word washes away the less than holy words we hear throughout the week.

Time for Sunday School


Sunday school will begin on Sunday, September 10th
